Sermon Title: But We HAD Hoped

1) Why were the disciples' faces downcast? (Verse 17)

What had the disciples *hoped* for? (Verse 21). Was their hope realized?

2) What is something that you have hoped for in the past? Did what you had hoped for come to fruition or not? Are you still waiting for a certain hope to come to fruition?

**3) What does this mean: "Hope should never be in the past tense."
Why is *living hope in Jesus Christ* more powerful than *hope in the past tense*?**

**4) What are the circumstances that finally enable the disciples to recognize Jesus?
(Verse 30-31) What is significant about this?**

5) How does Christ meet you in the ordinary and everyday?
